hen injured, sick, or newborn pets are brought into municipal shelters across North Carolina, the imbalance between available resources and the thousands of animals who need them places pets in the overcrowded shelters at high risk for euthanasia.

In order to bridge the gap and save as many lives as possible, **SPCA** Wake partners with North Carolina shelters from 58 different counties by transferring vulnerable pets into the SPCA's adoption program to help animals in need of veterinary care, foster homes, or simply more time to find a loving family. One of those partnerships is with our neighbors at the Johnston County Animal Shelter.

"As a government-run shelter, space always seems to be an issue," says Chuck Lively, Johnston County Shelter Supervisor. "Our partnership with the SPCA is a big asset in getting these animals

into loving homes."

n a rainy day in late April, a chime in our inbox indicated a special plea had just arrived. Our partner shelter in Warren County had emailed a cell phone video showing a young, happy puppy dragging her two back legs along the ground as she bounced around with glee.

As we watched the shelter's video, one thing became abundantly clear: this carefree puppy didn't know she was any different.

The puppy, who we later named Basketti, had been surrendered to be euthanized due to a congenital disability called spina bifida that left

they knew that without access to the specialty veterinary care Basketti would need, euthanasia would be her unavoidable fate.

But thanks to your ongoing support, the tools and care needed to save Basketti were waiting for her right here at the SPCA.

Basketti soon made the 61-mile journey to the SPCA to meet staff veterinarian Dr. Jennifer Bledsoe-Nix. After performing a thorough medical exam and confirming Basketti's diagnosis, Dr. Bledsoe-Nix began mapping out a treatment plan to get Basketti on track for a healthy, happy future.



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several weeks receiving physical therapy, medication for the open sores on her legs caused by dragging, and best of all, her very own custom-fit wheelchair that would grow along with her!

With a little training, Basketti was soon rolling around her foster home, smiling from ear to ear.

Meanwhile, a Zebulon resident named Allison Edwards was searching for a special dog to bring into her family. She was no stranger to caring for wheelchair dogs, and when she saw Basketti, it was love at first sight. Just two days later, she made it official.

Now two months after Basketti was adopted, she has been thriving in her new home, and Edwards can't talk about her without smiling. "She's been so much more than I ever thought," says Edwards. "She's so smart, she's curious. She's hilarious," she adds. "She does not let her disability slow her down at all."




In ordinary drive home one sweltering
June afternoon took an unexpected turn
when 85-year-old retiree Chuck Campbell
noticed a strange bag on the side of the road
that hadn't been there the day before. Compelled
by curiosity (or possibly fate), Chuck stopped to
investigate.

"I opened the bag and there were [these] beautiful tiny baby kittens, all nestled together," said Chuck, "and I just could not keep from crying."

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only two weeks old, their outlook was grim. Chuck brought them to his wife Vickie, and they quickly realized the kittens would need urgent medical care to survive, so they called SPCA Wake in the hopes of finding help.

When the Campbells arrived at our door, the kittens were already on the brink. But your support provided the round-the-clock care they needed to survive. The kittens were each bottle-fed, hydrated, and medically assessed by the SPCA's veterinarian. After a few weeks of continued treatment and close monitoring in a volunteer foster home, the kittens were brighteyed, playful, and growing like weeds.
