3,940 LIVE OUTCOMES

- 3,917 animals adopted
- 18 returned to owner or TNR'd
- 5 transferred to partner groups

5,500 ANIMALS SPAYED & NEUTERED

- 4,432 pets altered through the low-cost Saving Lives Clinic
- 1,068 pets altered through the spay/neuter voucher program

66,414 FIXES Number of pets spayed/neutered through the Saving Lives Clinic since its opening in 2009

That's 445,647 births prevented that likely would have needed shelter services.



60,109 CALLS FOR HELP ANSWERED

SPCA Wake helps pets stay in their homes and out of shelters by providing vital resources, assistance, and education to our community.



115,931 PET MEALS PROVIDED

Low-income households and homebound senior citizens receive pet food and supplies through the SPCA's AniMeals program and our partnerships with 7 local agencies including Meals on Wheels and the Food Bank of Eastern & Central NC.



962 ACTIVE VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers, working both on site and remotely, gave 44,785 hours, equivalent to 21 full-time employees.

OTHER ANIMAL OUTCOMES

SPCA Wake started 2021 with 252 animals in our care and took in an additional 4,058 animals throughout the year. Out of this total:

- 3.940 were live outcomes (see top of page)
- 42 died and 24 were euthanized by the SPCA or while in the care of our veterinary partners. Euthanasia at the SPCA is performed with kindness and dignity to relieve the suffering of animals who, for medical or behavior reasons, cannot be rehomed.
- 304 were in our care on 12-31-21



404 volunteer foster families cared for young, injured or elderly animals through the Foster Care Program.

35.4% of all pets rescued by the SPCA in 2021 spent time in foster.

hen we rescued a 10-year-old senior dog named Joy (formally known as Joyanna), we knew she was suffering from cancer. What

we didn't know is that her cancer had metastasized so badly that she could never be cured.

Joy had been surrendered to our shelter partners in Warren County after a life of living outside without attention. After her difficult life, we felt deeply in our hearts that Joy deserved more than to spend her last days in a shelter.

With a steely determination, we set out on a mission to show Joy how it felt to be loved, spoiled, and cherished in a real home by a loving family — a search for an angel with a selfless heart who

could give Joy the best days of her life. And soon, we found Adrianne.

Adrianne worked as a vet tech helping sick animals, and she'd cared for terminally ill dogs

before, filling their lives with memories and smiles and cherishing every moment together. With overflowing compassion and a huge heart, Adrianne could not have been a more perfect

family for Joy.

Before we knew it, Joy was on her way out our doors in a whirlwind of smiles and hugs as she left for home with her new mom.

Within hours of the adoption, Adrianne was sending us photos of Joy's new memories — a special treat on the way home, tail wags as she walked through her new front door, and absolute contentment as Joy curled up on her very own bed next to the Christmas tree. "She made herself right at home," said Adrianne, "and she found the cat food bowls immediately," she laughed.

For the rest of Joy's life, Adrianne devoted every spare minute to showing Joy how loved she really was. Between time in the yard

digging holes (Joy's favorite), extra special treats, and cozy naps in swirls of blankets and toys, Joy got to do all the things she loved most.

YOUR DONATIONS AT WORK

Joy passed away not long after adoption. But our grief was softened knowing that something magical had just happened. Joy had been given the greatest gift of her life — to be completely loved, unconditionally.


"Joy taught me that it is possible to trust someone when you have only ever been let down, that happiness is found in seemingly small things, and that it is possible to feel love in only a few days," Adrianne wrote in an online tribute to Joy.

SAVING McALISTER

Out of more than two thousand cats diverted from area shelters to SPCA Wake in 2021, over a hundred received urgent medical care for common feline illnesses, including *Feline Immunodeficiency Virus (FIV)* and *Feline Leukemia Virus (FeLV)*.

Your support saves the lives of special needs cats who need a little extra help finding loving homes.


housands of pets get lost from their owners in North Carolina every year.
Collars can be torn off, and name tags can be lost — but for most of the lucky ones who find their way back home, there's another identification tool they all have in common.

A microchip is a tiny device, smaller than a grain of rice, that is permanently implanted under a pet's scruff. This chip acts as a **reliable form of identification that stays with the pet for the rest of his or her life.**



Our team speaks with a local pet owner about other SPCA Wake services, such as low-cost spay & neuter.

Each microchip has a unique number or code that's revealed by a special scanner used by vet clinics



and animal shelters, and that number links to the family's contact information to facilitate a quick and easy reunion. So when a lost pet turns up at a local shelter, the shelter will immediately learn who owns that pet and how to contact them to share the good news that their pet has been found.

Each and every pet at SPCA Wake is microchipped prior to adoption, but the cost of microchips is prohibitive to many other families. As a result, the majority of pets in our state go without this essential safety net, leaving them vulnerable to being separated from their owners. Not only is this heartbreaking to families who love their pets, but it further contributes to the cycle of pet homelessness and shelter crowding in our state that we continue to battle together.

KEEPING FAMILIES TOGETHER

To close accessibility gaps like this, **SPCA Wake's Community Initiatives team continually works to assess and meet the needs of pets and pet owners throughout North Carolina** by implementing programs from pet food assistance and resource sharing with rural shelters, to community-oriented events like our recent \$5 Microchip Clinic in November 2021.

At our last public clinic, nearly 200 families from all across the Triangle traveled to Garner and braved a brisk November morning for the opportunity to give their pets permament paths back home at an affordable price.

And to the delight of the attendees, our teams shared additional resources and education about SPCA Wake's other programs that help keep pets and families together, including low-cost spay/neuter services, training & behavior assistance, and compassionate, expert advice for any questions or needs each family may have had.

Because of your ongoing support, **you are making it possible to bridge gaps** and ensure families in our community have access to the resources they need to keep their pets safe and secure.

Our hearts are warmed knowing that you have given each of these families the gift of peace of mind that their best friends and companions will forever have permanent,
