




4,291 LIVE OUTCOMES

REQUESTS THROUGH PET HELPLINE

SPCA Wake's Pet Helpline, the first in our region, provides assistance to keep pets in homes, out of shelters, and improve both human and animal lives. See page 7 for more information on these 2022 requests for help.



59,436 PET MEALS PROVIDED

Low-income households and homebound senior citizens receive pet food and supplies through partnerships with 7 local agencies, including Meals on Wheels of Wake County.

OTHER ANIMAL OUTCOMES

In CY 2022 the live release rate was 98.08%. SPCA Wake started 2022 with 304 pets in our care and took in an additional 4,413 pets throughout the year. Out of this total:

- 4,291 were live outcomes (see top of page)
- 39 died and 43 were euthanized by the SPCA or while in the care of our veterinary partners. Euthanasia at the SPCA is performed with kindness and dignity to relieve the suffering of animals who, for medical or behavior reasons, cannot be rehomed.
- 344 were in our care on 12-31-22



450 volunteer foster families cared for young, injured or elderly animals through the Foster Care Program.

41.1% of all pets rescued by the SPCA in 2022 spent time in foster.



FAMILIES SERV

New low-cost Wellness Clinics provided affordable, fundamental vet care, such as vaccines and microchips, for 965 owned pets in our community.



Volunteers, working both on-site and remotely, gave 15,251 hours, equivalent to 8 full-time employees.

COMMUNITY CAT

sterilized, vaccinated, and released or rehomed in order to reduce feral cat and kitten overpopulation in North Carolina.

FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

89% of each donor dollar went to programs & program support with 11% spent on to fundraising.* SPCA Wake is nationally recognized for responsible financial stewardship and transparency to donors, earning high marks from both

hen Dustin arrived to work in the early morning hours of December 24, the temperature was a bitter 11° F. As he pulled into the parking lot, he could just make out the shape of an animal kennel near the front door of the SPCA. Approaching the kennel, Dustin thought, please don't let there be an animal in there.

But when he brought his cell phone up to illuminate the kennel, he could see the small shape of a dog inside. His light reflected off dozens of small icicles clinging to the puppy's fur and face.

Inside the kennel was a badly injured 6-month old Boxer puppy. Dustin's initial fear was that she might be dead – but then the puppy looked up at him. She had been in freezing temperatures for hours, and Dustin knew he had to act fast.

He pulled the kennel into the building and pried the door open. Certain the freezing puppy was in a great deal of pain, he moved carefully, tucking warm blankets around her and placing a space heater on low nearby to warm her slowly.

Odyssey was soon rushed to one of SPCA's veterinary partners, Oak Heart Vet Hospital, where veterinarians surgically repaired the badly infected wound on the puppy's front leg. Thanks to the quick intervention, her leg was saved. Vets created a custom splint to optimize limb position and encourage the puppy to put weight on the leg.

Today, Odyssey is safe because of you! More than that – she is bright, sassy, and full of spirit! And best of all, she's getting a true fairytale ending – her new mom is a local veterinarian who can provide a rich, full life with the best possible care. Thank you for providing a second chance for all pets in need, including the unexpected emergencies.

Your ongoing support allows us to make quick decisions when time is of the essence, ensuring the best possible outcome for sick and injured animals. You are creating stories of triumph instead of tragedy, and we are forever grateful.

Compassion for everyone involved.

After 56 years of helping the pets and people in our community, we've learned there is usually more to a story than what meets the eye. Yes, someone abandoned a badly injured puppy in freezing temperatures. But we don't know their circumstances or how they found the dog. Perhaps their only option at that time was to leave her somewhere they knew she'd receive the attention she desperately needed. Perhaps they couldn't afford critical veterinary care.

We know many people are struggling to care for their pets right now. And that's why we want to make sure our message of compassion for whoever left the puppy on our doorstep doesn't get lost in the circumstances of how we found sweet Odyssey.

2022 IMPACT REPORT CONTINUED

After a significant increase in demand for animal care services following the COVID-19 pandemic, **SPCA Wake launched the Pet Helpline** — a first-of-its-kind initiative designed to make it easy for our community to find pet-related support.



The new Pet Helpline connects callers with pet resources and programs while also providing insight into what programs and services our community needs most.




6,744 REQUESTS THROUGH PET HELPLINE

TOP 5 TYPES OF HELPLINE REQUESTS RECEIVED










According to our first year of Helpline insights, the greatest need for rehoming assistance is for stray kittens found in the community (510 requests).

In June 2022, Libby Hardwick found a young kitten (above) wandering alone at a construction site. Libby contacted the Pet Helpline to ask the SPCA's help in finding her a loving home.

When we received her request, our Helpline team coordinated with our Intake team to offer the kitten a place in our adoption program.

The kitten, Teddy, was adopted in July and has been safe and cared for by her new family ever since!

Common themes from these insights show an obvious need in our community for more low-cost spay/neuter surgeries, microchips, and behavior/training assistance to reduce the number of lost/found animals and requests to surrender a pet.

In 2022, SPCA Wake took active steps to meet these needs:

- Increasing the number of low-cost spay/neuter surgeries offered at the Saving Lives Clinic
- Provided 449 free or "pay-what-you-can" spay/neuter surgeries to help those who could not afford the low-cost prices
- Hosted four low-cost Wellness Clinics, providing affordable, essential vet care (e.g., microchips, vaccines) for 610 local families and their pets

Continuing to listen to the needs of our community through the Helpline will help us take even more action in 2023 to support pets and people.
