But we took comfort in imagining Winston's journey to SPCA Wake from his perspective:





n the hustle and bustle of Raleigh's city streets, it's not uncommon to encounter individuals experiencing homelessness. What may surprise some, however, is how many of them have pets by their sides. Despite the challenges of living on the streets, these individuals have found friendship and unconditional love in their animal companions.

For many homeless individuals, their pets are their lifeline, offering a sense of purpose and belonging in a world that can often be unwelcoming. Many pet owners report that their animals give them a reason to keep going, even on the toughest days.

Despite facing their own struggles, these owners will often prioritize the well-being of their companion animals, ensuring they have enough food, water, and shelter to survive the harsh realities of street life. Finding a shelter that will accept pets can be difficult, and accessing veterinary care and pet supplies can be a particular challenge.

However, thanks to two new partnerships with St. John's Metropolitan Community Church and the Wake County Women's Center, SPCA Wake can provide some support to these pet owners.

St. John's and the Women's Center are both significantly impacting the lives of our unhoused community members. St. John's runs a shelter for men, a shelter for women, and, on very cold nights, a White Flag emergency shelter. The

Women's Center serves marginalized single women experiencing homelessness.

SPCA Wake is helping these human shelters transform some designated spaces into pet-friendly accommodations stocked with supplies.

"Our commitment is to help these human shelters with the housing, care, and feeding of their clients' pets," said Molly Stone, Community Impact Director. "These pet-friendly spaces will help reach people whose desire to remain with their pets may have prevented them from receiving safe shelter services in the past," said Stone.

SPCA Wake's role will be to make it as easy as possible for the teams of dedicated people-carers to welcome pets into their shelters.

#### MAKING AN IMPACT FOR SENIORS

PCA Wake is making a huge impact in the lives of low-income families and homebound seniors with our Pet Food Assistance Program. The program, which provides much-needed pet food to those who may struggle to afford it, is a lifeline for many in the community who want to ensure their pet companions are fed and cared for.

SPCA Wake provides support directly to homebound seniors in need with in-home deliveries of pet food and supplies. We also provide food pick-up options for families struggling with temporary financial hardship.

This past year, we have grown our partnership with Meals on Wheels of Wake County (MOW). SPCA Wake distributes food to MOW clients in two ways: First, we deliver pet food to the MOW Distribution Center for delivery to their daily clients. Second, we distribute pet food directly to clients who attend area Friendship Cafes.

The MOW Friendship Cafe program provides seniors with daily meals at various congregate locations in the community, opportunities to participate in multiple activities included in the program, and, crucially, a place to experience robust social interactions and form meaningful interpersonal connections. SPCA staff and volunteers bring pet food and supplies to six Cafe locations each month, and the two most recent additions are Capitol Towers Apartments and the Rosenwald School.

#### **HEALTHY PETS, HEALTHY COMMUNITY**

n March 2, SPCA Wake hosted the first of four community Wellness Clinics for 2024. This lowcost/no-cost vaccine and microchip clinic for dogs and cats drew in a crowd of pet owners eager to ensure the health and well-being of their furry friends.

That day, 271 dogs and cats received vaccines and/or microchips, plus free collars and engraved tags, as part of SPCA Wake's effort to keep pets with their families and out of the shelter system.

Volunteers at the event worked tirelessly to check attendees in, administer vaccines, and provide information about ongoing pet care. "These wellness clinics are important because they help pet owners who cannot otherwise afford to do these things," said Volunteer Nadia Chamberlin. "These events make a huge difference in the lives of pets and their owners."


Soon after arriving at SPCA Wake, our partners at Care First Animal Hospital did a thorough exam and a series of tests to better understand the cause of Dempsey's head tilt.

ith one look at Dempsey, we knew his case was unusual. The little puppy's gaze swung around the room aimlessly; his teeth and gums were stained an unnatural shade of blue, and he held a strange posture with his head always tilted to his left.

The same slew of questions entered every person's mind in the room. Can he see us? Was he poisoned? Did he eat something to cause this? Will he be okay?

To help solve this medical mystery, we took Dempsey to Care First Animal Hospital for an urgent exam. A series of tests shed more light on this puppy's long list of concerns.

Dempsey is completely deaf and partially blind, and he appeared to have eaten rat poison. Some cognitive deficit was causing his



permanent head tilt, and he was most likely the result of irresponsible breeding.

The good news is, after some supportive veterinary care and monitoring, Dempsey was stable and no longer in danger. But, whether caused by genetic misfortune or poison, Dempsey's limitations would be with him for the rest of his life.

Despite his challenges, Dempsey is as happygo-lucky as any other puppy – perhaps more so! He bounces around his room, scarfs down his treats, and showers kisses on any visitor who comes his way.

With the right family and a few adaptations, this special puppy is destined for a long, joyful life, spreading compassion and cheer wherever he goes. And thanks to your generous support, Dempsey found himself in just the right place to be loved and supported on the road to adoption.

eet our new adoption partner – Purr Cup Café! You may be thinking, "Wait, how does a café save lives?" Purr Cup Café isn't your ordinary coffee house. It's a cat café! Here's how it works: the SPCA provides the café with a constant supply of adoptable cats, and the café helps them find homes. It's that simple (plus, it's only a ten-minute drive from the SPCA Pet Adoption Center).

Shelters nationwide need help with an influx of pets needing space. Available kennel space is a scarce and coveted resource. Last year, thanks to your support, **SPCA Wake found homes for 2,289 cats.** We hope to find even more in 2024.

Every day, the SPCA receives calls from shelter partners across the state pleading for us to transfer cats like Misty (the playful, gray cat pictured above), who was lingering at the Warren County municipal shelter.

Staff at the Warren County shelter loved her antics and noted how Misty would fall asleep in the middle of her kennel, forcing them to clean around her (and she wouldn't take no for an answer). However, as each day passed, Misty witnessed more cats and kittens arriving, and the kennel space was running low.

That's when the SPCA received a call to assist. Donor support like yours allowed us to take Misty into the SPCA's adoption program. Her carefree attitude melted our staff's hearts, and her passive sass added to her charm. We knew the perfect spot for Misty to find a home – Purr Cup Café.

This café opens up more adoption spaces at the SPCA, which allows the SPCA to take in <u>more</u> pets from municipal shelters across NC!

Purr Cup Café provides space for cats like Misty, who may take longer to find a family. We are so incredibly grateful for this opportunity to save more lives.
